Workshop: Assessing for Intervention with persons using DFSV

QUEENSLAND

WORKSHOP CONTENT

The assessment process for new clients serves a number of purposes and is foundational in shaping the intervention that follows. Since domestic, family and sexualised violence (DFSV) is generally patterned behaviour, understanding the client's behaviour patterns is a key aspect of assessment that can assist us to intervene more effectively.

We can consider pattern in numerous ways. Firstly, we can focus attention on the incident that brought a user of DFSV to the assessment and explore how many times they have engaged in the behaviour. Secondly, viewing DFSV as it relates to the person's own childhood experiences of violence. This generational patterning helps us to predict what future risk is in store. Thirdly, we can view patterned behaviour as a series of stepping stones towards much more serious harm towards others. In other words, how is this pattern changing through the course of the relationship.

A question for all of us engaging in intervention work is, "What's going on here, and how can we work most effectively?". In this workshop we will explore how:

- our assessment is crucial for identifying the touch points for intervention. No longer can we use a one size fits all approach given the diversity and complexity of those attending interventions.
- thorough assessment through exploring patterns of incidents, generational patterning, and stepping-stone patterns, allows us to be more thoughtful around where and how to intervene.
- identifying patterns allows users of violence to know what to focus upon during interventions.

He has worked as a part-time lecturer in Social Work at Canterbury University and is now involved full-time with Hall McMaster and Associates (HMA) as manager, writer of materials and principal trainer.

Ken McMaster has published two books and co-edited three titles on Domestic Violence and Offender Interventions. He consults and provides training regularly with Corrections departments and community organisations across Australia, Aotearoa / New Zealand and other countries. HMA offender programs and Family Violence intervention programs have been in use in correctional and community settings across Queensland and in other states for a number of years.
