DOING SHAME WITHOUT SHAMING: RESPONDING TO AFFECT IN MEN'S VIOLENCE

Half day presentation by Alan Jenkins

This workshop will highlight and illustrate ways of responding to men's affective reactions when addressing family violence.

Violence is often mediated through reactive affects which can be overlooked in cognitive interventions and psychoeducational programs.

The workshop will focus on the importance of understanding and responding to the parasympathetic effects of shame, disgust and contempt which are central in the mediation of violence and abusive behaviour. When these affects are misunderstood they tend to produce reactive behaviour for the men we work with and within ourselves. However, these affects can also enable a productive and ethical movement towards just, respectful and loving connections within families.

The workshop will highlight non-shaming ways of responding, rather than reacting, within the complex assemblage of power relations and moral imperatives that support family violence.

IDENTIFYING AND DEVELOPING COLLABORATION OPPORTUNITIES FOR SPEAQ AND QDVSN

The Queensland Domestic Violence Services Network (QDVSN) is a network consisting of Twelve regional specialist DFV services, the Immigrant Women's Support Service (IWSS) and the Qld Centre for Domestic and Family Violence Research (QCDFVR). Their work centres on providing safety and support for victims/survivors of DFV, from crisis work, longer term support, through to co-ordinated responses, systems advocacy and research. SPEAQ members interact with organisations within QDVSN on a regular basis – what opportunities are there for our networks to work more closely together?

SPEAQ exists for the practitioners it supports, to increase the safety and effectiveness of the work we do, and ultimately to increase safety for those experiencing violence, and accountability and change for those who abuse. GUEST SPEAKER INFO

ALAN IENKINS

Alan has worked in a range of multi-undisciplinary teams addressing violence and abusive behaviour for 30 years. His therapeutic approach was first outlined in the book, *Invitations to Responsibility: The Therapeutic Engagement of Men Who are Violent and Abusive* (1990) and in a variety of subsequent journal articles and reports.

Alan has become increasingly intrigued with possibilities for the discovery of ethical and respectful ways of relating. The valuing of ethics, fairness and the importance of protest against injustice has led him to stray considerably from the path prescribed in his early training as a psychologist, towards a political analysis of abuse. Alan's most recent book is *Becoming Ethical: A Parallel Political Journey with Men Who Have Abused*, published in 2009.

He is currently a director of Nada, an independent service that provides intervention in family abuse, violence and workplace harassment. He manages the Mary St. Program for young people who have sexually assaulted, along with their caregivers and members of their communities.
